ORDINANCE 191 AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE, ORDERING THE CLOSING UP, VACATING AND ABANDONING OF A PORTION OF CATALINA AVENUE

The City Council of the City of Torrance does ordain as follows:

Section 1. Whereas on the 15th day of April, 1929, in conformity with the Statutes of the State of California, said City Council passed its resolution No. 121 declaring that the public interest and convenience require and that it was its intention to order certain work to be done as herein specified and describing said work and specifying the exterior boundaries of the district of lands to be affected or benefited by said work and to be assessed to pay the damages, costs and expenses thereof, and

Whereas, the Street Superintendent of the said City of Torrance duly notified along the line of said contemplated work and improvement at not more than three hundred feet in distance apart but not less than three feet in all, notices of the passage of the said resolution, its date and briefly, the work of improvement proposed and referred to said resolution for further consideration, and did also cause a notice similar in substance to be published for four successive insertions in a weekly newspaper, to-wit: The Torrance Herald, published and circulated in the City of Torrance and designated by the said City Council in said resolution.
