## THREE-BAGGER SPELLS RUIN FOR BUICKS

### Torrance Blues Shut Out Pasadena Team in Slow Game Sunday

When Walter Wolfe laced out a three base hit in the first inning Sunday, he ruined a good ball game for the Pasadena Buicks and gave the Torrance Blues a lead that was never challenged.

Meyler, pitching for Pasadena, was a bit unsteady at first, and the razzing he got from the fans did not help either his disposition or his control.

In the visitors' half of the first inning, with the count 3 and 2, J. Rice connected with a single, but died on second as G. Stout was out Walsh to Atwood. Del Porto fanned and Dowell filed out to center. One hit, no runs.

Freuche, lead-off man for the Blues, was passed. Meyler, perhaps had been insufficiently warmed up before entering the box, for after the second frame he steeled and pitched an admirable game. Hampton also received a free trip to first, Atwood stopped a fast shoot with his body and the corners were loaded. Nobody out.

To clean up and Wolfe took it by slamming out a long fly that went almost to the fence in left center. Freuche, Hampton and Atwood raced home, took beating the throw-in to a safe margin. Ducauzau filed out to center. Goodman was out short to first on a ground out, and Bill Goodman touched Meyler for a single, the first of his three hits. Wolfe scored. Oswald, center fielder, was out on an infield fly. Two passes two hits four runs.

Big Jim Walsh pitched a nice game. With one or more strike-outs in each inning, he fanned a total of eleven. While he was touched for 10 sacrifices, he kept the hits well scattered so that they did no damage. Only in the eighth did Pasadena succeed in bunching hits, with a possibility of some runs except for an unusual play by which J. Rice was forced out. Rice had connected with his third single of the day and was on first when G. Stout popped out on a high foot fly to Goodman. Del Porto, Pasadena captain-manager, hit a fly to short right field and sped to first. Rice watching to see if the ball would be caught

for an out held on to the bag also. Ducauzau trapped the ball giving Del Porto title to first base and forcing Rice who saw he was unable to make second ahead of a short snap throw. Dowell singled Castro fanned for the third time retreating the side. Three hits no runs.
