HIGH SCHOOL

In the past years junior and senior high schools have always had their aud calls together. This year, however, plans are being made to give the junior high school students more recognition than they have received in the past years.

Three aud calls have been planned for them. The first will probably be a Christmas pageant, and the other two will celebrate some holiday.

Mrs. Morse, Latin teacher at the high school, has returned from a two and a half months' tour of Europe. She visited seven countries, and found the cities of Paris, London, Rome, to be most interesting.

Torrance high school is to have carnival Wednesday, Nov. 27. It will be sponsored by the Girls' and Boys' Leagues. It is given this year in connection with open house at the high school. New buildings will be inspected, dinner served in the new cafeteria. During part of the afternoon the carnival will be open and all evening where everyone in the community will have fun galore.

New books on aviation and science have been purchased for the T.H.S. library, which is one of the most complete school libraries in this section.
