## SHOE STRING STRIP SEWER LINE READY

Residents of East Torrance and East Gardens within the Los Angeles Shoestring Strip may now make connections with the main lines of the Metropolitan Sewer District No. 5.

On Monday of this week the Los Angeles City Council completed the annexation of the Shoestring Strip to District No. 5 of the Metropolitan Sewer System. This action was taken, according to Chief Engineer Warren, in order that residents of these districts could secure sewage disposal more cheaply than if the City of Los Angeles laid mains in the Shoestring Strip.

Mr. Warren stated that while local sewer connections may be made at once in East Torrance and East Gardens, it was not required, especially in cases where there is satisfactory cesspool facilities already installed. However, in cases of new buildings or where there are faulty cesspools, Mr. Warren stated that he advised connections of the sewer rather than spend additional money on cesspool repair or construction. Those people whose homes are now equipped with satisfactory cesspools are not being encouraged to hook up with the Metropolitan System until the outfall line has been laid at White's Point, Warren said.
