Dirty Terminals May Run Down Your Battery

A great deal of battery trouble may be directly laid to dirty terminals, states Harvold's Willard Service Station at 1618 Cravens avenue.

"One of the five important points of our inspection service which is given to all batteries brought in for testing and filling service, is the cleaning of terminals.

"The gas spray which is prevalent when the generator is charging the battery will collect on terminals and posts and the positive terminal will disintegrate and corrode if it is not kept clean. The negative terminal, while not affected by disintegration, should be cleaned also. After cleaning, the terminals should be tightened on the post so that a good electrical connection is insured.

"Dirty terminals will readily cut down the charging rate and are often the cause of an undercharged battery. Terminals that are loose as well as dirty will even cause the lights to burn out.

"Regular attendance at a battery station for these services is one of the best habits a motorist can form. A small thing—a much neglected thing—but an important thing, nevertheless, keeping terminals tight, clean and greased."

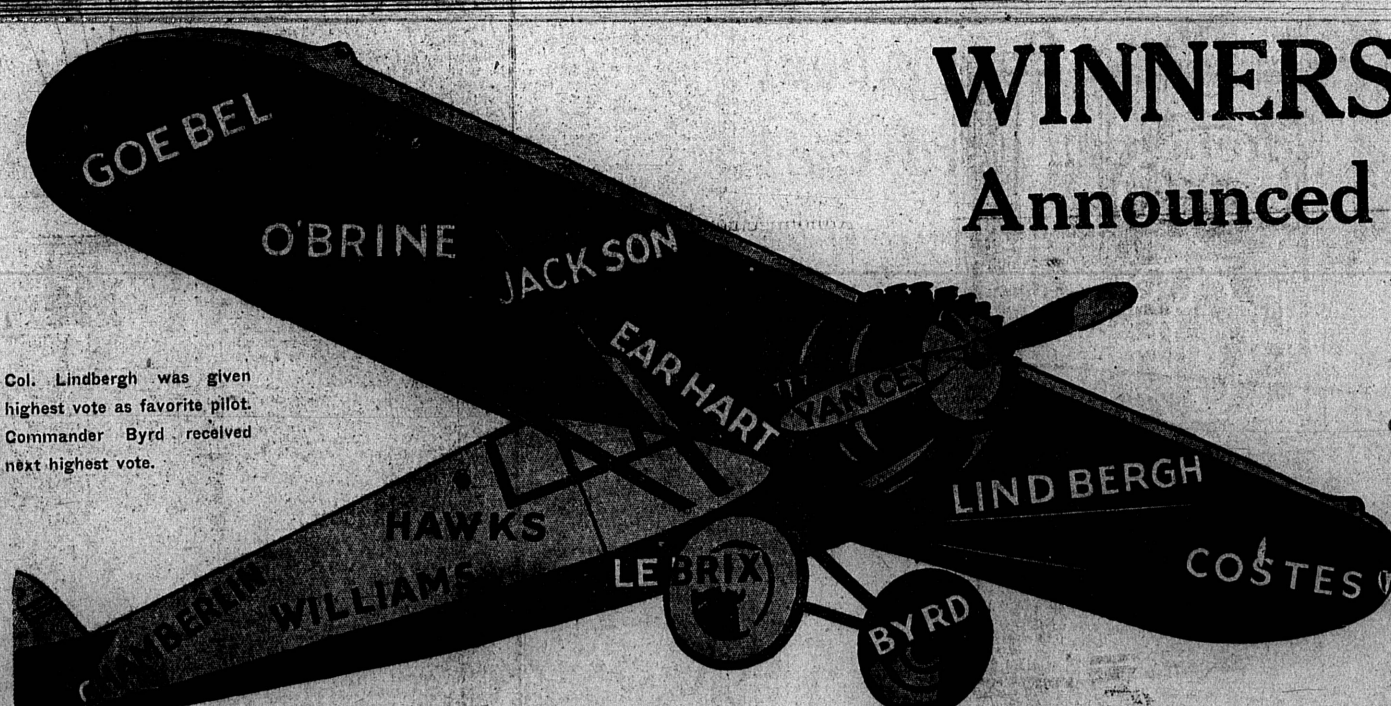
