### IT'S LICENSE PLATE TIME IN TORRANCE

Local Insurance Agents Provide Convenient Service for Public  
How about those new license plates for your car?  
This is one of the little matters that will intrude itself on the Christmas shopping this year, according to L. B. Kelsey and the Torrance General Insurance Company and Paul Venderhake who each year secure the plates as a convenience to their insurance customers and the general public in this district.  
Applications will be accepted any time now, and plates will be furnished immediately after December 15th. The law requires all automobiles and trucks to have the motor and displayed by January 31, and applications must be made by January 15, but local motorists are requested to make their applications early and avoid the rush and inconveniences at the end of January. There is a penalty of 100% for violation of these provisions.  
Mr. Kelsey's office is at 1105 Marcellina avenue, Mr. Venderhake at Carson and Cravens and the Torrance General Insurance Agency at 1320 Sartori avenue. The fee for all passenger cars is \$3.00 and must accompany the application.

## How To Create A Rock Garden

The purpose of the average rock garden is to provide a congenial shelter for those lovely Alpine plants that cannot thrive under ordinary conditions. In their native environment, these plants grow on high mountain slopes, usually in the full sun where rain and fog keep them moist and cool, and the water drains quickly from the stony, sandy slopes.  
Sometimes there is a rock wall or steep embankment to be planted, and the only treatment possible is in the form of a rock garden.

In building a rock garden, one should produce these mountain conditions as nearly as possible. The important requirements are a sloping, sunny position, with some protection from the hot sun and wind, and good drainage. As the hills and mounds are made up, mix with the soil, consisting of two parts loam, one part coarse sand, and one part leaf mould, is best. Most Alpine plants are very deep rooted, and require a depth of at least 12 inches of soil.

In too many rock gardens, the rocks are the outstanding feature, whereas they should form only the background for the plants. Rather soft, weathered stones, lava rock, porous and absorbent, are best. Use a few large rock, broken bricks, leaf soil, coarse sand, and be careful to have drainage with a good portion beneath the soil, and always sloping down and back, so as to catch and retain the moisture in the pockets. The pockets formed by the rocks should be deep, and firmly packed with soil. If possible set out the plants as you build the garden, filling the pockets between the rocks tightly with earth, so as to leave no air spaces. Leaf mould around the plants enriches the soil, holds the moisture near the surface, and keeps down the weeds. Set the plants in groups of three or more of one kind, to obtain the natural effect of their having seeded themselves in colonies.
