(Continued from Page 1) plays over 6000 people. All the oil in the Dutch East Indies is of a high grade paraffin base, and the Royal Dutch Shell company has built an enormous works factory in Sumatra as a result. Oil conservation is practiced very effectively in the Dutch East Indies, Mr. McLaren said. Offsetting is practiced and about 100,000 tons of oil are used in the only two companies holding leases, the Standard Oil of New York. When one company begins drilling, the other is not permitted to drill in the territory. Few wells are producing of capacity, and in fact many are being shut down to conserve their limited oil. The drilling is done by Americans or English and the same general practices are used as are common in California. The mechanics are largely Chinese, and the laborers receive all the same pay, depending on their locality in which the drilling is being done.

Mr. McLaren said that all water must be boiled before being drunk by Americans or Europeans, as illness is almost sure to follow otherwise; but the natives seem to be able to drink any kind of water without becoming ill. The natives are of small stature, weighing about 100 pounds. A peculiar characteristic of the native is that while he can only lift about 200 pounds off the ground, he can carry a load of 250 pounds on his shoulders. One frequently sees hundreds of natives carrying a heavy piece of machinery placed on cross rails. The jungle and the soft ground practically eliminates the use of tractors or trucks.
