No refrigerator cars transported his fruit up the recently completed Valley route of the Southern Pacific to San Francisco—a distance of 484 miles. His oranges were packed in barrels and transported in climsy, exposed freight cars. But Pathfinder & Citrus Pioneer Wolfskill saw visions of these three carloads multiplied many fold; he envisioned the barren waste lands of Southern California transformed into bounteous citrus groves; he thought of the days when Southern California oranges might be purchased in every town in the U. S—even foreign countries.

Chaffee Champions

In a blazing limelight Chaffee Union High School last week swept triumphantly into national prominence. Like few other schools in Southern California, Chaffee High School was on the lips of representatives from thirty states of the union. Reason: Last month to four of Chaffee's students came the news that in Kansas City there was soon to be held the American Royal Live Stock Show at Kansas City. In and about Chaffee these four young men were known as expert stock judges. Therefore, it was decided to send the four to Kansas City, enter them in the live-stock judging contests at the national show. When Chaffee's students arrived they learned that they would have to compete with other teams from thirty other states.

The contests held, the results were announced last week, placing the names of Chaffee's now famous students as winners of first prize. Those who had never heard of Chaffee learned that it was a thriving high school in Ontario, Calif., learned that the names of the nation's most accurate livestock judges were. H. Dutton. F. Palmer, C. Birdsall, and J. Tate. Tate was believed to have been high man for the entire contest. The Chaffee team was last week on its way to Chicago, seeking further honors.

The victory at Kansas City is claimed as a great climax at Chaffee, establishing that school's agricultural department among the strongest in the West.

Cauliflower harvest in the southern counties is well under way, with the "Snowball" variety expected to reach its peak of production—this week. An "Intentions to Plant" survey recently made by the State Crop Reporting Service revealed that hat cauliflower, to be harvested after Feb. 1, in Southern California, will surpass in quantity that harvested prior to February. It is predicted that the late cauliflower harvest (after Feb. 1) will run as follows in acreage: Los Angeles and Orange, 1,000; San Diego, 450; Santa Barbara, 5000; Ventura, 50.

Like all the celery in Southern California it showed a decided lack of rain, coupled with some ravages from disease and worm damage.
