50th Anniversary of Parents' Wedding, Is Pastor's Theme

Rev. John B. Speed's father and mother celebrated their sixtieth wedding anniversary last Sunday, Dec. 1, in Texas, and Rev. Speed took as his subject: "Christ's Loving Cup." He told of his visit back ten years ago to be at the 50th anniversary and how the citizens of the town where his father was mayor at the time, gave to them a very fine loving cup in token of what they meant to the country "round about." He said in part: "Christ's loving cup is similar in many ways. They entered into a covenant relationship and Christ makes a covenant with us. It is a Blood covenant. He took the cup, and when He had given thanks He gave it to them, and they drank of it." He promised as did the husband never to forsake or leave thee and no husband was ever more faithful to keep his vow.

"The anniversary is in memory of the many happy years and the facts that have actually happened. The fact of the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus need not be repeated any more than these short sixty years. 'Ye do show forth His death till He comes.' A memorial day is in memory of our heroes but it is the fact of having heroes. We can have no loving cup without a Dewey, or a Sampson, or a Christ. So this cup this morning is a memorial to the divine clothed in the garb of humanity. This fact of a sacrificial death for sin for all who will accept or enter into covenant is a date around which all other dates point.

"We have living heroes, all are not dead, the Hero of all heroes is alive for ever more for He conquered death and the grave. We are told what He is doing and is to do. 'Till He comes,' would indicate a prophetic cup. We are looking for his coming, pray for it, expect it. Reading the record tells us the time is short, yet no man knoweth just when but can know it is even at the door.

"The relationship of a couple who have lived together for sixty years cannot be told. It is indeed a very intimate relationship. A communion cup draws us away from all strife, envy, hatred, malice and the like. Puts in our hearts a forgiving spirit and we feel our unworthiness. I am thankful I do not have to wait until I feel worthy but I have vowed a vow and am willing to keep it. So on this anniversary we are renewing our covenant with Him. Would to God every member of this church were here this morning."

WOULD PUT BIBLE BACK IN SCHOOLS

E. F. Rudeen, representing the Lincoln Government League is circulating petitions to make the daily reading of the Bible compulsory in the public schools.

Following is the proposed "Lincoln Public School Bible plan," upon which is based the petition to be presented to the legislature, asking that it be enacted into a state law:

"Section 1. The Bible in the King James version shall be placed in every public school library, and the state superintendent of public instruction shall authorize for the class room a Scripture Book, containing a course of daily Bible reading within a fifteen-verse limit without comment.

"Section 2. The teachers employed in all such schools shall at the opening of each morning session of such schools, stand with pupils facing the national flag and sing or recite the last verse of 'America,' as our country's prayer. Following which the teacher shall read to the pupils the Bible portion prescribed for that day.

"Section 3. The teacher shall not comment upon any of the Scripture passages read. In response to any pupil for comment upon passages read the teacher shall refer the inquirer to his parents or guardian."
