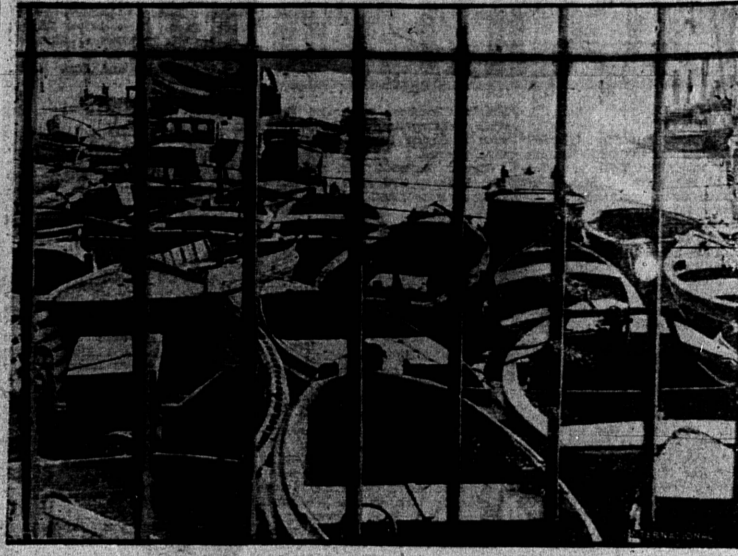

TO ABOLISH DAIRY SMELL AT WALTERIA

A delegation of Walteria residents, headed by L. P. Newman, president of the Walteria Chamber of Commerce, protested the existence of a wholesale dairy operating in Walteria to the City Council Tuesday evening. Complaint was made that the dairy was obnoxious smelling and attracted flies. It was explained by the Walteria resident that while the dairy was not operating at present, fences were being erected and preparations made for bringing back the cows and the Walteria people requested the Council to rescind a permit to operate the dairy. City Clerk A. H. Bartlett explained that there was no ordinance regulating wholesale dairies, the present business license ordinance only covers retail establishments.

However, the Council assured the Walteria delegation that an inspection would be made of the situation and the nuisance eliminated. In an informal discussion among Councilmen after the meeting, it was learned that the city officials intend to prohibit the operation of the dairy in Walteria.
