The Southern Pacific is providing new passenger equipment for several of their eastern limited trains according to Lawson Overman, district passenger agent. The famous Golden State Limited which operates between Southern California and Chicago in 6 1/2 hours is now carrying all new equipment. The new drawing room observation cars contain ladies' lounge, shower bath and maid service. These cars are all of the newest designs in woodwork and electric lighting and present an elegant appearance to travelers. The men's club car has barber, valet and bath, also general news service.

The Argonaut Limited, which operates between Southern California and New Orleans has been provided with new lounge observation cars. These new lounge cars have a fountain service dispensing cold drinks and ice cream, men's lounge seating ten and separate ladies lounge with equal space and fixtures. These cars also contain barber shop and bath. The windows of this lounge car are of heat resisting glass, which is the first of its kind ever placed in train equipment. This car also contains observation parlor with the elimination of the outside observation platform.
