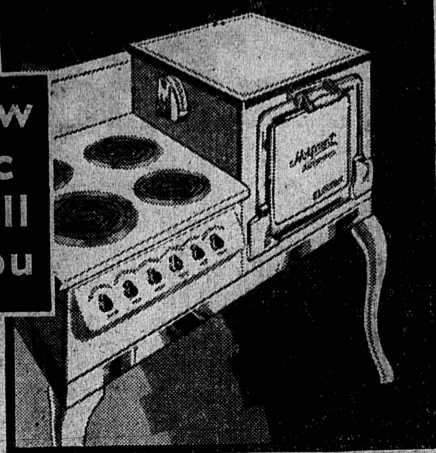

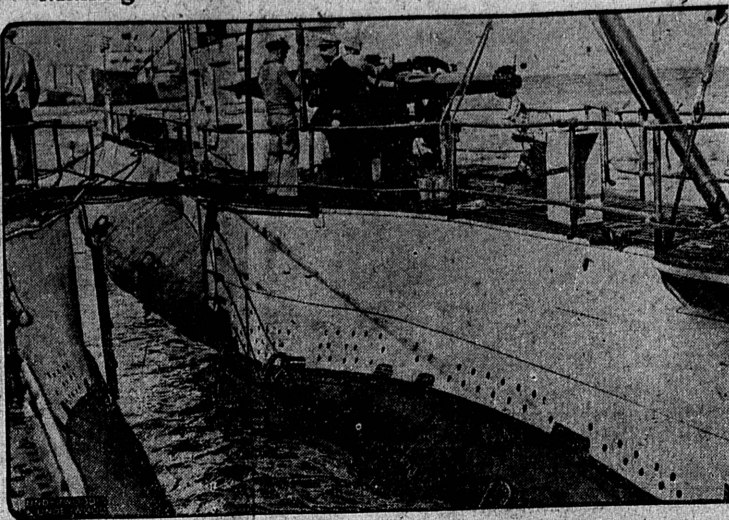

Making Uncle Sam's Submarines Safe for Crews



Various devices have been adopted by the United States navy for the safety of submarines and their crews. This picture of the new S-29 shows the "blind eyes" near the water's edge. These rings will permit cables to be attached in case of sinking and pontoons will then raise the sunken ship. Other safety equipment on the S-29 includes Mousen "lungs" (quickly attachable breathing devices for the crew), a safety escape lock on deck from which the crew can escape, a marker buoy which will serve as a marker for a rescue ship, and a telephone buoy which also will go to the surface and serve as a means of communication with the crew below.

and Director of the State Chamber of Commerce, will give a short illustrated address on "Aviation." Dr. Young has been an aeronautical enthusiast for several years and has procured from the Department of Commerce, Bureau of Aeronautics, some very representative and interesting material dealing with the subject of aviation.

THAT CAR OF YOURS

Among the accessories there are many which appeal to large groups of motorists. One is the especially treated cloth that is used for cleaning the windshield.
Loose lugs are accountable for the cracking noises heard when turning corners.
Squeaking brakes should suggest inspection of the drums. If they are out of round or worn unevenly, they will make a noise.
Loose tools still account for many of the mysterious rattles in an automobile.
A leaky carburetor is annoying as well as a waster of gasoline. The usual cause is a worn needle valve which should be ground and re-seated or replaced.
Ignition points should be cleaned and adjusted occasionally. This is a small operation for your garage man and the results more than repay for the expenditure.
Chassis tightening on your

car should include tightening spring clips and spring U bolts. If these are allowed to become loose, broken spring leaves may result.
Racing your motor in low speed at any time is poor practice, but it is particularly bad when pulling a long grade. The correct thing to do is to use whichever speed possible, without causing the motor to labor.
Low gear should always be used in starting a car. The use of any other gear causes the clutch to slip.
A solution to the problem of wet ignition systems on automobiles and airplanes, with the consequent stalling of the motor, has now been perfected, declare officials of the Rinjido Distributing Company, manufacturers of "Dri-Wire."
