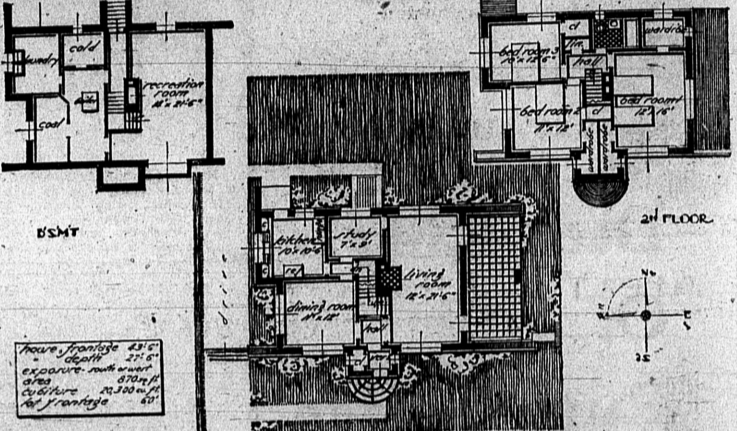
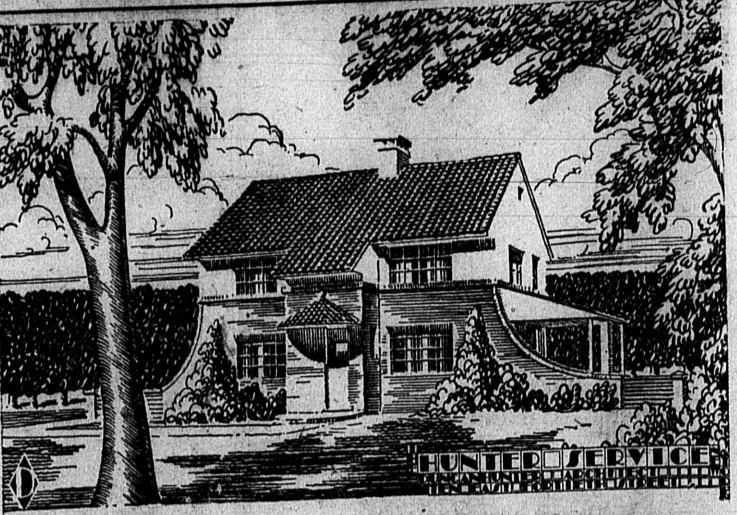

Modern Yet Not Extreme



THE COMPO
By DUNCANHUNTER, Architect, New York
We hear so much about the "modern" and we see so much of it so called, that is either extreme in character or that does not fit into its surroundings that some of us become skeptical and overlook the good sound logic which underlies the basic of all true modern.
The Compo is a small livable house of simple modern character without the extreme. It is a house that would fit into almost any neighborhood, Colonial, English or what-not, giving a distinctive and modern home without strife with the neighbors, a sort of happy medium we might say in its simple good taste. The plan layout shows the favored compact central stairway, a great space saver—and space costs money—whether used to advantage or not. The general construction of the house is frame with stucco finish, except the front which is brick. The roof is tile. With these materials there is no painting to speak of—and repair bills are low. A poorly built house is a most expensive buy—while good sound construction costs but a trifle more at the start it shows real economies in the upkeep as the years go by.
The study on the first floor and the Recreation Room in the basement are not found in most houses of moderate size, yet these two extra rooms are of great value since they almost double the "living capacity" of the home. No longer does the living room alone serve the family in a complete way, the modern way where each does as he or she likes, reads more than one general room if there is a family. Jazz and study don't mix at the same moment or in the same room. With the recreation room the man can have a poker game at the same time the Mrs. entertains a neighbor or has a dance for the sister or a birthday party in the living room.
The Compo stacks up like this: Basement: Recreation room, laundry, cold room, heater, space.
First floor: Entrance vestibule with coat closet, living room, dining room, study and kitchen.
Second floor: three bed rooms, a bath and ample wardrobes and closets.
Third floor: (No plan of which is shown).
Ceiling heights: Basement, seven feet; first floor, eight feet; second floor, eight feet.
Exposure: The plans as shown are for a lot facing south or west. For a lot facing north or east the plans should be reversed.
Lot size: House frontage, 43 feet 6 inches, side clearance left 10 feet right 6 feet 6 inches, lot frontage minimum 60 feet.
Construction: Frame, with stucco finish except front wall which is brick; roof, tile; foundation, concrete; windows, steel casements; doors, wood, to special details.
Interiors: Floors, wood for linoleum finish; walls, plaster; ceilings, plaster; kitchen, plaster, bath room, tile; steam heat, gas and electric wiring.
Capacity, 20,300 cubic feet.
