## Naval Academy Requirements Are Changed

High school graduates who intend entering the naval academy must have enlisted in the navy one year prior to June 1st, according to a new ruling approved by the acting secretary of the navy. Previously the enlistment was required one year prior to July 1st, and while the new ruling affects applicants for the naval academy course in the future it does not affect those already enrolled.

It is pointed out by the U. S. Navy Recruiting Substation at San Pedro, that high school graduates who intend to take the examinations for the naval academy course next year, must enlist this year prior to June 1st in order to be eligible. One hundred enlisted men who pass the required mental and physical tests are privileged to take the naval academy course. High school students graduating this year who intend to apply for the academy course next year should enlist in the U. S. Navy before June 1st, or in other words before they actually graduate from high school, thus avoiding another year's delay in entering the naval academy.
