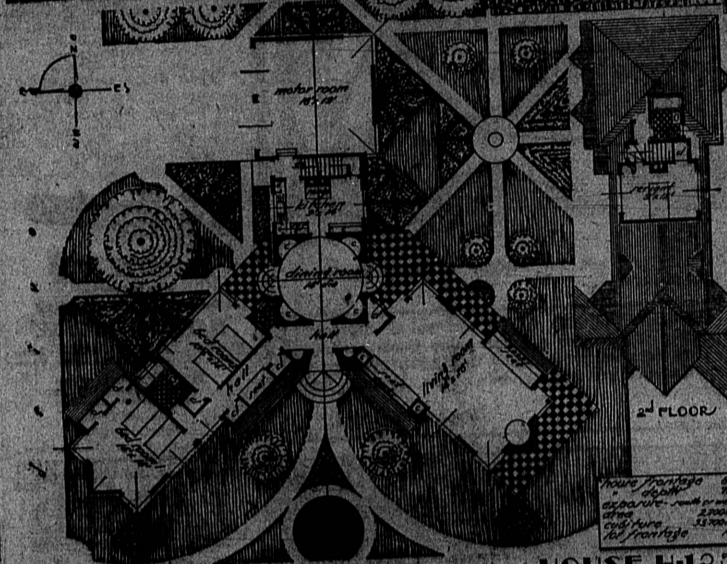

The Independent - The Modern



THE AERO
By Duncanhunter, Architect
New York
The independence—the liberty—freedom from the bonds of the ancient styles—their rules and regulations—their layouts and patterns—which no more fit our present times in architecture than does the ox-cart as a mode of transportation—these first qualities found in our modern architecture refresh one like a glass of cool water after a hot and dusty hike—the real antique is, you know, a bit stuffy. The modern is—or it should be—clear, clean-cut, refreshing and suited to purpose—a certain feeling of pureness—a sort of positiveness that compels respect if not admiration. The modern—when it is well done—has a very definite trace of the logic throughout—a "tricky" detail or a playful piece of ornament gives the required "pop"—so the result need never be flat or tame.
"The Aero" is modern—it shows logic as well as independence of the ancient styles. It has a plan layout that is suited to modern American ways of living with plenty of outdoor atmosphere. It is a country type of home that gives the effect of freedom from all restraint—save the rules of good taste. Note the many windows and their large size, the "open" feeling of the plan and many and varied exposures of the different rooms. Note the concentration of the service and the isolation of the family rooms; featuring a smooth functioning of household activities. The ceilings of the living room, dining room and bed room No. 1 go up into roof construction to a height of 14 feet.
The Aero provides—
First Floor
Entrance hall with lavatory, coat closet, living room, dining room, kitchen, two bed rooms, bath, closets and a two-car motor room.
Second Floor
Servant's room, bath and storage space.
Ceiling Heights
Basement—seven feet; first floor—fourteen feet in main rooms, eight feet in other rooms; second floor—eight feet.
Exposure
The plans as shown are for a lot facing north or west. For a lot facing south or east the plans should be reversed.
Lot Size
House frontage, 30 feet; side clearance—left, 8 feet; right, 12 feet. Lot frontage—minimum, 100 feet.
Construction
Frame—with stucco finish except front wall and base, which are brick.
Roof—shingles.
Foundation—concrete.
Windows—steel casements.
Doors—wood, to special details.
Interiors
Floors—wood for linoleum finish.
Walls—plaster.
Ceilings—plaster.
Kitchen—plaster.
Bath rooms—tile.
Steam heat, gas and electric wiring.
Capacity—35,700 cubic feet.
