Excursion Rates to San Francisco Given By Lassco

Two popular Spring Excursions to San Francisco, designed to impress upon residents of Los Angeles and Long Beach and surrounding areas the charm of water travel along the California coast during the spring and summer months, have been announced by the Los Angeles Steamship Company for the May 9 and May 13 northbound sailings of the luxurious coastwise express liner Yale. A low round-trip fare of \$10 from Los Angeles and Long Beach will prevail for the two sailings, and a six-day return limit will be in effect on the excursion tickets.

Practically a third of the total space on each sailing is available at the low round-trip rate, according to officials of the line. The round-trip rate for standard outside rooms will be \$2 extra. The round-trip rate for de luxe rooms will be \$20.

Two similar low rate excursions will also be operated by LASSCO out of San Francisco to Los Angeles and Long Beach, one on the Harvard sailing from San Francisco May 9, and the other on the Yale sailing May 10.

BACK SEAT DRIVER OK'd

Railroad Commissioner Cites Statistics on Crossing Accidents

FRESNO, Cal. (UP)—After this when the back seat driver speaks up it is the better part of wisdom to listen.

Authority for this statement is no less than Leon Whitwell, state railroad commissioner, and a man who does on backing up his statements with statistics.

In a luncheon talk here, Whitwell said that in 40 per cent of all railroad grade crossing accidents in California there was only one occupant of the car involved, and therefore no opportunity for a "back seat driver" to warn the real driver.

Whitwell said it merely boiled down to the fact that four eyes are better than two, and that frequently the oft-scorned "back seat driver" is responsible for preventing accidents.

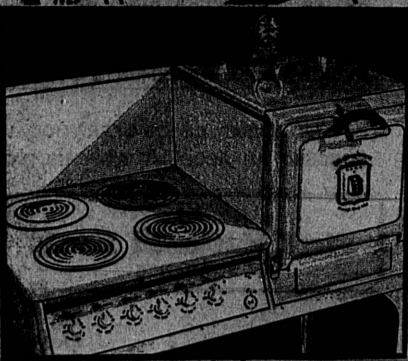
