Non-Resident Workers Asked To Move Here

Non-resident employees of Torrance industries will be furnished a list of desirable rental quarters in Torrance, that are now vacant and offered for rent at prices that compare favorably with rentals in near-by cities, according to a plan submitted to directors of the Torrance Chamber of Commerce this week by the housing committee of the chamber.

It is expected that the plan will meet with favor among industrial executives, as R. R. Smith, superintendent of the Union Tool plant stated that he would personally see that this information reached the non-resident employees of the Union Tool plant. Executives in other local industrial plants have also indicated a desire to cooperate in the movement to persuade non-resident employees of Torrance factories to move to Torrance.
