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"Firing at Forty" Condemned Now by Legion Heads

Unemployment Said Most Serious Question to Veterans

SAN FRANCISCO—Condemnation of corporations and industries in California adhering to a policy of "firing at forty" employees, who have given excellent service to their employers, has been voted by the executive committee of the American Legion and efforts will be made by an aroused public opinion against employers who practice the turning out of long serving employees who have reached the age of forty.

Attention of the American Legion heads to the "firing at forty" practice was called to the situation by B. W. Gearhart of Fresno, chairman of the American Legion's Americanization Commission and by Phil O. Solon of Oakland, chairman of the World War veterans State Legislative Committee. Solon also told of the proposed program of legislation to be presented to the next state legislature for the relief of war veterans.

With 36,000 unemployed world war veterans in California, the unemployment situation and the "firing at forty" policy will be discussed at the coming state convention of the American Legion at Sacramento in August. State Commander Clarence L. Kincaid of this legion announced. Richard C. Stillwell, superintendent of the veterans' division, U. S. Department of Labor, with offices in San Francisco, has been requested to prepare a report on the unemployment among the veterans for presentation at the Sacramento convention.

The unemployment problem as far as the World War veterans are concerned is one of the most serious questions confronting the American Legion at the present time, State Commander Kincaid announced. He has asked the individual posts of his organization throughout California to do their part in helping legionnaires in distress because of the lack of employment.
