Rev. Transchel Will Leave for Oxnard Church
Keystone Pastor Accepts Bid To Larger Field and Moves Tomorrow
KEYSTONE—Rev. H. R. Transchel, pastor of the Keystone Baptist church for many years, has accepted the pastorate at the First Baptist church at Oxnard. Rev. Transchel preached his last service at the Keystone church Sunday morning, August 10, and will be moving to new duties at the Oxnard church Sunday, August 17.
Rev. Transchel began his work in Keystone at Booster's hall in 1923 as a Sunday school superintendent. Later the Sunday school was moved to the home of Mrs. H. R. Nidever on Dolores street and the present church building erected on Dolores street in 1925. The Keystone Baptist church was organized in 1927 and recognized as a regular Baptist church in January, 1928, with a charter membership of 24. In leaving the Keystone pastorate, Rev. Transchel leaves a membership of 28, and leaves the Sunday school roll 113 on the Sunday school roll.
During his pastorate the following church societies have been organized among the young people: the World Wide Guild, the Crusaders, the Royal Ambassadors, and the Baptist Young People's Union. During his work in Keystone Rev. Transchel has been ably assisted at all times by his wife. Both Reverend and Mrs. Transchel have earned a reputation as vocal soloists while here. They have both given of their time unstintingly and will be greatly missed.
