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Section 2. It is the intention of the City Council of the City of Torrance to call an election in that certain proposed Municipal Improvement District having boundaries as hereinafter described, or as the same may be modified in the manner provided in the aforesaid act, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors of said district the proposition of authorizing the issuance and sale of bonds of said district in the manner prescribed in said Act, approved May 24, 1927, for the purpose of creating an indebtedness to be represented by bonds and expenses of acquiring and constructing the proposed improvement hereinafter described, and to pay the incidental expenses in connection therewith.

Section 3. That the exterior boundaries of said Municipal Improvement District, which shall be known as "Act of 1927 Municipal Improvement District No. 1 of the City of Torrance," are described as follows: Beginning at a southeasterly corner of the boundary of the City of Torrance as said boundary existed on August 7, 1930, said corner being also a point in the southeasterly line of Camino Real as shown on Map No. C-1, subject of Street Names, officially adopted by Resolution No. 120 of the Board of Trustees of said City of Torrance, passed June 19, 1928, and on file in the office of the Surveyor of Los Angeles County; said Camino Real being also known as Long Beach-Redondo Road, or Sepulveda Boulevard; said point being also on the westerly boundary of the City of Los Angeles (Shoe String Addition), as said boundary existed August 7, 1930; thence northerly along the southeasterly line of said road to a direct line to an angle point therein; thence westerly along the southerly line of said road in a direct line to an angle point therein; thence westerly along the southerly line of said road to the southerly line of the westerly line of Madrona Avenue as shown on said Map; thence northerly along said last mentioned southerly prolongation and westerly line of Madrona Avenue in a direct line 7011 feet more or less northwesterly to the southerly line of Lot 6, Tract No. 7873, as shown on Map recorded in Book 109, pages 99 and 100, of Maps Records of said County, said northerly line being 1102.51 feet, more or less, southerly from and parallel with the southerly line of said last mentioned Lot; thence easterly along said westerly prolongation and northerly line of said Lot 6 a distance of 1102.51 feet more or less to a westerly line of said Lot 6; thence northerly along said mentioned westerly line 1102.51 feet more or less to the afore-said most northerly line of said Lot 6; thence easterly along said last mentioned most northerly line and along the northerly lines of Tract No. 9901, as shown on Map recorded in Book 137, page 47, of Maps, Records of said County, and Tract No. 8857, as shown on map recorded in Book 146, page 84, of Maps, Records of said County, and Tract No. 4958, as shown on map recorded in Book 146, page 85, of Maps, Records of said County, and Tract No. 6223, as shown on map recorded in Book 66, pages 2 and 3, of Maps, Records of said County, and the easterly prolongations thereof in a direct line to the southerly boundary of said district, as said boundary existed on August 7, 1930; thence southerly along said easterly boundary in a direct line to the point of beginning.

Section 4. The proposed improvement work or public utility for said district is the acquisition and construction of a water producing and distributing system, including wells, pumps, tanks, reservoirs, distribution mains, and land, rights of way, and easements therefor, and all other necessary equipment and appurtenances for a complete water producing, purifying and distributing system, for the sale of water for domestic, agricultural, industrial and other uses.

Section 5. The estimated cost of said proposed improvement is Three Hundred Eighty One Thousand Dollars (\$381,000.00) and the estimated amount of incidental expenses in connection with said improvement is Nineteen Thousand Dollars (\$19,000.00). That the amount of the principal of the indebtedness proposed to be incurred is Four Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$400,000.00).

Section 6. An election will be held in said district on the 25th day of September, 1930, for the purpose of submitting to the qualified electors thereof the proposition of incurring an indebtedness in the total amount of Four Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$400,000.00) by the issuance of bonds of said district to pay the costs and expenses of such proposed improvement.

Section 7. A map showing the exterior boundaries of such district within the territory immediately contiguous thereto, and a general description of the proposed improvement, are on file in the office of the City Clerk of the City of Torrance, which said map shall govern for all details as to the extent of said district.

Section 8. The 2nd day of September, 1930, at the hour of 8:00 o'clock P.M. in the Council Chamber of the City of Torrance, in the City Hall of said city, is hereby fixed as the date, hour and place for the hearing of the proposed improvement, which shall be held with the clerk of said City Council, at or before said time of hearing as provided for by said Act approved May 24, 1927.

Section 9. The City Clerk shall certify to the adoption of this ordinance and cause the same to be published twice in the Torrance Herald, a newspaper of general circulation, published once each week in said City of Torrance.

New Electrical Substation in Palos Verdes Is Being Erected

Construction of a new electrical substation in Palos Verdes, on Via La Selva near Via Pasqual, has been begun by the Southern California Edison Company Ltd., according to the announcement here today by C. W. Kolner, district manager. The new station, designated as the Palos Verdes substation, will be placed in service about November 1, at a cost of approximately \$50,000.

The installation of electrical equipment will provide an initial service capacity of 2,000 horsepower to meet the increasing requirements for electricity in the Palos Verdes area. The growth of land in this section of the district has been steady, Mr. Kolner said and demands, as well as assured future requirements, made the substation installation at this time advisable. The station will carry the lighting, heating, cooking, refrigeration and other domestic service loads for the Palos Verdes territory.

The substation building, plans for which have been approved by the Palos Verdes art commission, will be in harmony in appearance with its surroundings. Stucco and tile will be used in the exterior finish of the building and the grounds will be landscaped to harmonize with the natural beauty of the site. All of the electrical equipment not contained in the station building will be housed in specially constructed containers in the rear yard and the service lines will be installed underground.

The work now under way at the Palos Verdes substation is a part of the company's program for the reinforcement and extension of service facilities in the district this year. To be carried out at a cost of approximately \$385,000, Mr. Kolner said. More than 10,500 new horsepower of service capacity will be added in the various substations of the district during the twelve months.

This district, according to Mr. Kolner, will share extensively in the benefits to result from the installation of a large amount of new equipment in the Los Fresnos substation in Torrance. An investment of the company's plans to spend in excess of \$600,000 for this work was made here recently. This new equipment will facilitate the distribution of electric energy throughout a large area north and west of the company's steam-electric generating station on Terminal 1 and Long Beach.

State Crops Are Reported in Fine Shape for Month

SACRAMENTO, (UP)—California's climate lived up to its reputation again during the past month, with field crops prospering, while in the mid-west many of these same crops were ruined by drought.

The California Cooperative Crop Reporting Service has compiled its summer resume of the field crop situation and found the state in a most advantageous position. Of the 35 major field crops in the state, only three indicate a decrease in production for the year. They are cotton, potatoes, and "tame hay", exclusive of alfalfa and grain hay.

Bumper Crops Assured. Wheat and barley led in increased production, with the former standing at 14,994,000 bushels, an increase over 1929 of about 2,500,000, and barley forecast at 33,398,000 bushels, a 1,000,000 bushel increase. Indian corn, the harvest hit of all crops in the mid-west, showed an increase of nearly 300,000 bushels in California.

Cotton and Hops Less. The increased area of sugar beets throughout the Sacramento and San Joaquin valleys will materially increase the average yield per acre for the state. Production is forecast at 793,000 tons, which is a 350,000 ton increase over 1929. An increase was noted generally for the U. S. Cotton has fallen off in production in this state, as it has all over the producing centers of the nation. About 221,000 bales are predicted, a loss of some 30,000 bales compared with last year. Only about 60 per cent of the hop acreage worked in 1929 is under cultivation this year, with some improvement reported during the past month, principally in the Sacramento valley. Coast hops are poor condition and probable production will not exceed 4,200,000 pounds.

Night School Class To Make Yule Gifts

Those who enter the Torrance Evening High school class in handicrafts, redcraft and drawing Tuesday evening will immediately begin production of many articles suitable for Christmas gifts, according to Miss Ada Chase, instructor.
