"A contrast equally as striking exists today between the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints and the sects of Christendom. We, as a Church, have Jesus Christ as our head, being led through the channels of revelation—a vital agency—the stream of existence unobstructed through the will of God, and is unceasingly directed to his children upon the earth through his servants, the prophets."

"On the other hand, churches professing Christianity are but stagnant pools of man's thoughts and ideas upon the subjects of God and the Gospel of Jesus Christ. These pools have been fed by the seepage of error and sin, and the debris of the past, and the pools much that is false and even that which is false."

"The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints stands paramount in its ability to quench the spiritual thirst of mankind. With Christ as its living head, and with divine revelation as its foundation, it is indeed a vitalized stream, a well of water springing up to everlasting life."

Yesteryears' Newspapers

Fourth Liberty Loan; Popular Songs; Spanish Influenza; Pancho Villa; "Sammy" — Do You Remember Them in September, 1918?

(Editor's Note: Have you a copy of an old newspaper? If you have, The Herald would like to see it and pass on its interesting features to our readers. All old papers will be returned to the owners intact within a week after they are received.)

Yellowed and with its once-brilliant red headlines now a faded pink, the September 28, 1918, copy of the Los Angeles Examiner, owned by Mrs. Charles LeBeau, of Keystone, is our text-book today.

This issue includes the complete text of President Wilson's great war speech in behalf of the fourth Liberty Loan and outlined the objectives of the war. The headlines proclaimed that "Hum-Ahly Quits" in connection with the Belgian parliament's approval of the armistice offered that nation by the Allies.

War news occupies most of the space in Mrs. LeBeau's Examiner of 12 years ago as at that time the A. E. F. had ripped through the Hindenburg line defenses at Cambrai in the second day of the Meuse-Argonne offensive.

Locally, a 52-year-old ranch hand, named Luke, was "sliced" and roughly manhandled by persons in a Broadway motion picture theater because he failed to stand when the orchestra played the national anthem. He was escorted to the city jail where "he was booked on suspicion of being an enemy alien."

Do you remember these musical hits that were sweeping the country 12 years ago and were advertised extensively? "Joan of Arc," "On Honolulu Bay," "K-K-Katy," "Hi Liza Jane," "Swanee," and "They Go Wild, Simply Wild Over Me."

There were no radio advertisements then, but plenty of phonograph announcements. Theodore Bell was to contest the governorship race with Governor Stephens.

To Change McDonald Sewer District Now
A petition will be circulated among property owners in the recently-annexed McDonald tract who are now served by the Gardena-Mosier sewer maintenance district asking them to place the sewer district in Torrance by withdrawing from the county district. The petition must be signed by 50 per cent of the free-holders in the district. The sewer problem right now belongs in Torrance as that section is now in this city's limits, it is reported.
