Few Americaas know that the original Presidential Thanksgiving Proclamation was lost for over a hundred years; that it was found at an auction sale in 1921; that it was bought by the Library of Congress for \$300; and that it now reposes in the archives of that institution one of the most valuable documents in the world. The division of information and Publication of the George Washington in a statement issued this week relates the story of the lost proclamation.

On September 25, 1789; Elias Boudinot introduced the following resolution in the House of Representatives:

"Regolved, That a joint committee of both Houses be directed to wait upon the President of the United States, to request that he would recommend to the people of the United States at one of the United States and prayer, to be observed by a ck nowledging, with gratful hearts, the many signal favors of Almight God, especially by affording them an opportunity to extablish a constitution of government for their safety and happiness."
