GLIDER CLUB IS PROPOSED BY FIREMAN

A. D. Stevenson Wants to Get Names of Those Interested

Are you interested in aviation? Would you like to learn to fly and become familiar with the construction and operation of gliders? If so, see A. D. Stevenson at the Torrance fire station, who is planning to organize the Torrance Glider club. "We are frequently asked: 'What good are gliders?' If we look back through the history of aviation we will find that not only the Wright brothers built and flew gliders before they built and flew airplanes, but that Glenn Curtiss, Anthony Fokker, Glenn Martin and practically all the most noted aeronautical engineers have used gliders extensively in their studies and work," Stevenson said today. "Gilding is becoming the world's greatest sport. There is no thrill equal to piloting a glider through the air, making turns, banks and circles—all as silently as a canoe would slip through the water. It is also the best training one could have if he intends to fly powered ships. We hope to get in touch with a large number of local men who are interested in gliders and start to work right away," Stevenson concluded.

State's Health Said Alright, Thank You!

By the United Press SACRAMENTO. — Never before have such satisfactory health conditions prevailed in California as during the first nine months of 1930, according to findings of the state department of public health. Not only has the death rate during 1930 been low in California, but also in all parts of the United States as well. If the present conditions prevail for the rest of the year, 1930 will be a year of "best records" in the low death rate for all causes combined, and for several diseases of major importance. Outstanding examples are tuberculosis, diphtheria, diarrheal complaints, and deaths of mothers in child birth. The typhoid fever death rate is also running lower than ever before.
