Catching of Criminals by Air and Wire is Proposal to Legislature

Catching criminals by use of the radio and telegraph is only one of the unique proposals to be laid before the 1931 legislature. No. 181320, "Blocking Criminals," has already been tried out and proved successful. Authorities predict it will be the most effective means of battling organized crime in California.

Here's the plan: Every traffic officer in Los Angeles county will be equipped with a radio receiving set and headphones—right on his motorcycle. Every sheriff's office will be hooked up on a central teletype system, using the telegraph-type writer.

Tests Have Been Made

At four or five "key" points in the state, such as Los Angeles, Bakersfield, Sacramento, San Francisco and Chico, radio broadcasting stations will be established, with low wave lengths.

Suppose a murder is committed or a bank robbed. Immediately the news will be broadcast to all officers in that locality. They will be able to establish blockades on the highways the fugitive is traveling. Experimental tests have already been made of this plan from Sacramento. Traffic officers in Station and Imperial counties have heard their superior officers speaking as clearly as if they were

nearby. To set up the broadcasting stations and equip all highway officers with receivers would cost \$50,000, it is estimated.

Confidential messages, descriptions of criminals and other information would be transmitted over the teletype. The radio would be used only in case of a statewide manhunt. The last legislature approved such an arrangement but the measure was pocket-vetoed when it was found the hookup could be financed out of the motor vehicle funds. But now, with the radio in prospect for the highway patrol, it is considered likely that a combination of the two will result.
