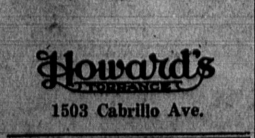
Poinsettias were used profusely at a delightful New Year party given by the Betsy Ross Star club at the Masonic Temple Monday morning.

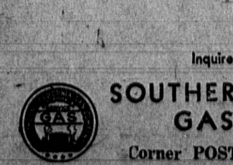

AGUA CALIENTE, Mexico.—At this time of the year, before the winter tourist season commences, the hotels here are filled chiefly by visitors who drive or fly down from their California residences. These people are more or less permanent Californians and the costumes are particularly interesting because they represent the taste of women who have acquired a technique in the selection of spectator sports costumes for resort wear.

Because the weather is rather warm, dresses are more in evidence than suits, although a number of jacket dresses and three-piece suits also appear. Both the one-piece dress and the two-piece dress in tunic effect are popular, and a great many of both styles have short or elbow-length sleeves. Short sleeves also appear on a number of jackets, particularly in bolero types. When the jacket of the dress is short-sleeved, either elbow-length or about four-button slip-on sleeves are worn.

The favorite fabrics are light-weight tweeds in woven or knitted styles, Jersey bouclette, wool crepe, angora and flannel. Velvet and corduroy are noted in several smart costumes, but not in great numbers.
