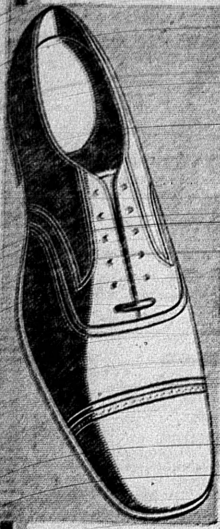

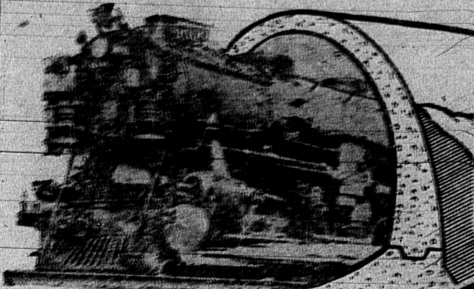

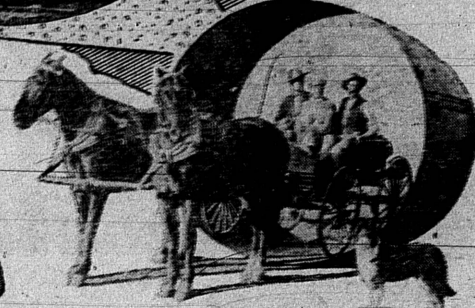


LARGEST RAILWAY ENGINE in U. S. Can Pass Through METROPOLITAN AQUEDUCT SECTION

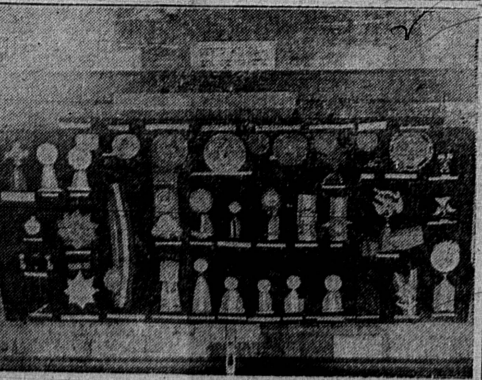
Today is Your Last Chance to File For 1931 License Plates

It will be unlawful to drive with 1930 license plates after today, Thursday, unless the driver has filed an application for new plates. This final word of warning was issued yesterday to motorists by the division of motor vehicles. The person who drives and cannot produce evidence that he has filed an application is liable to arrest.

Until February 1 plates for passenger cars may be obtained at the regular fee of \$3. After that date, however, the penalty provided by law for delinquents is in force and the applicant will be required to pay double. The division states there is still a large number of motorists who have not yet applied and preparations have been made to handle the last minute rush.

Plates may be secured at any branch office of the division or of the automobile clubs, but the simplest way to get them is to forward the certificates of registration and the fee to the main office at Sacramento by mail.
