COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

Torrance, California, January 5, 1931. MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TORRANCE

The first regular meeting of the New Year of the City Council of the City of Torrance was held in the Council Chambers at Torrance, California, January 6th, 1931...

The following Trustees were present: Trustees Bell, Nelson, Steiner and Dennis.

Trustee Steiner moved that the minutes of the regular meeting of December 16th, 1930, the minutes of the adjourned regular meeting of December 19th, 1930, and the minutes of the adjourned regular meeting of December 30th, 1930, all be adopted.

Trustee Bell seconded the motion, which was carried unanimously.

Deputy City Clerk Stevens read a communication from Mrs. L. M. Payne, under date of January 6th, 1931, requesting a license to give readings by cards in the City of Torrance.

Trustee Nelson moved that the license be disallowed.

Trustee Steiner seconded the motion, which was carried unanimously.

Deputy City Clerk Stevens read a communication from the Regional Planning Commission, Los Angeles, California, under date of December 19th, 1930, asking that a map of Tract No. 10406 be approved which is enclosed.

Engineer Leonard stated that this tract is outside the City of Torrance, and is east of the Shoe String Strip. It is a requirement of the Planning Commission that this be passed by the Council and Engineer Leonard stated that he had no objection to the subdivision.

Attorney Briney read: RESOLUTION NO. 483 Approving Map of Tract No. 10406, Presented by the Regional Planning Commission.

Trustee Steiner moved that Resolution No. 483 be adopted.

Trustee Bell seconded the motion, which was duly carried by the following roll call vote: Ayes: Trustees Bell, Nelson, Steiner and Dennis. Noes: None.

Trustee Steiner reported with reference to the water suit, that the papers would be ready to file on the 30th of the month.

The final reading of Ordinance No. 212, "An Ordinance Fixing Rules Regarding Organization of Fire Department in the City of Torrance," was held over till the next regular meeting.

Deputy City Clerk Stevens read a communication from Ralph R. Howe, 1508 Anapola Avenue, Torrance, California, under date of December 24th, 1930, complaining that a police officer had man-handled his son.

Trustee Nelson moved that the communication be referred to the Police Commission.

Trustee Bell seconded the motion, which was carried unanimously.

Trustee Steiner suggested that the City Clerk be instructed to answer this letter and state the disposition of the Council.

At 8:15 P. M., Attorney Briney read a representative from the Fidelity & Casualty Company of New York, who had talked to the Council at a few meetings also, explained to the Council and answered some of their questions in regard to the City taking out public liability insurance.

This matter was laid over till the Council could investigate it further.

Oral communications were next in order.

Mr. Carl Hyde asked the Council if they were willing to place themselves on record to the County Board of Supervisors requesting County aid for the development of facilities in the Alondra Park Project.

RESOLUTION NO. 484 A Resolution of the City Council of Torrance, Urging the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors to Make an Appropriation of Funds for the Purpose of Improving the Alondra Park.

Trustee Steiner moved that Resolution No. 484 be adopted.

Trustee Bell seconded the motion, which was duly carried by the following roll call vote: Ayes: Trustees Bell, Nelson, Steiner and Dennis. Noes: None.

Trustee Steiner stated that the McDonald Tract people had no way of disposing of their cans and garbage. The district is too large for the present garbage collector, and he believed a man going around twice a week would be sufficient to take care of that tract.

Mr. Morford, here in Torrance, is already equipped for that particular work.

Mayor Dennis stated that he and Mr. Hyde had talked with Mr. Morford, and he would be willing to accept this job if he could include the Shoe String Strip and possibly Huntington Tract in his route, but that the McDonald Tract would not be worth while bothering with.

Trustee Steiner said that he would see Mr. Morford within the next few days about it, and Mr. Hyde told the Council he was going to Los Angeles tomorrow, and he would see what arrangements could be made with the City of Los Angeles for the collection of garbage in the Shoe String Strip.

Trustee Steiner moved that the Street Department be authorized to purchase a tank of road oil.

Trustee Bell seconded the motion, which was duly carried by the following roll call vote: Ayes: Trustees Bell, Nelson, Steiner and Dennis. Noes: None.
