The council's minds were made up now.

"The city has done most of the advance," Dennis stated, "and I don't believe we should delay action any longer in filing our suit."

In reply, the attorney said that once court proceedings were started by the city they would add to the cost, both to the city and to the bondholders' newest offer.

"You said you had some figures to give a committee—do you mean the \$12,500 figure," questioned Councilman Smith.

Hearing New Offer

"The question is now what the plant can be purchased for by the city and what concessions the bondholders will grant," Supt. replied. "The directors back in Chicago were glad the city turned down the offer to purchase the plant at the price I gave you last month, as it was too low. However, I believe I have a proposition that will interest you—if you have not made up your minds not to receive any offer—if you have and want to fight it out in court, let's know right now."

The council, after some further discussion, agreed to meet with Col. Suthen Thursday afternoon, at 2:30 o'clock at the city hall and hear the new offer.
