Douglas Fairbanks is on a hunting trip in Asia and Africa—as all the world of movie fans knows. While he was aboard the S.S. Belgenland in the Pacific, his friend Homer Snow, son of a well-known explorer, thought it would be a good idea to let Fairbanks hear what big game really sounds like. Snow placed a telephone call for his friend aboard ship, and during the conversation let his pet mountain lion "Bruce" roar into the transmitter. This shore-to-ship call, incidentally, was one of the longest on record, going from San Francisco to New York by the Bell System's regular land lines, and thence back across the continent and over the Pacific to the Belgenland from the shore-to-ship radio telephone transmitting station.
