**WHAT IS HOME WITHOUT A GARDEN?**  
SPRAY YOUR TREES NOW

Nearly every home garden has its peach or plum tree, and nearly every tree has its fungus unless it is sprayed. Peach leaf curl, oozing, and many other ailments may be prevented or controlled by spraying during the winter, and again in the spring when the flower buds begin to show color, according to A. F. Eckert, manager of the Gardena Valley Milling Company, at 2527 Wilmington-Redondo boulevard, Lomita.  
"Dry Lime Sulphur is the popular spray material to be used for this purpose. Mix 10 to 12 heaping tablespoonsful of the Dry Lime Sulphur in one gallon of water, stir thoroughly and apply preferably with a compressed air sprayer. A driving force will apply the spray more effectively than by any other method." Eckert said this week.  
"Be sure that the trunk and forks are well sprayed and the limbs out to the very tips. Do this every year and you will not only improve the foliage of your tree, but the fruit crop as well."  
"Apricots should be sprayed also, but the material to be used
