Birth Rate Remains Same for Two Years

In the matter of race suicide California is neutral. Advocates of race suicide lost nothing nor did opponents gain in the number of births during 1930 as compared with the number during the year 1929. The births, based on population, remained exactly the same, 14.7 births per thousand of population.

There was an increase in the total number of births in 1930 to the extent of 2,841 but the increase just did keep pace with the increase in population. In 1930 there were 84,932 babies added to the state's wealth. In 1929 there were 81,498 births. In Los Angeles county, 31,187 babies were born during 1930 as compared with 23,008 one year ago.

Sound Motion Picture Feature Of Ford Exhibit By Local Dealers

A sound motion picture graphically portraying the story of the Ford Motor Company, and its widespread activities will be exhibited free of charge in a special Ford exhibit to be held at the showrooms of Schultz, Pocham and Schultz, 1514 Cabrillo avenue, Torrance, Monday and Tuesday evenings April 20 and 21. The shows will start each evening at 7:30 o'clock.

The picture, entitled "A Tour Through the Ford Factory," will show the gathering of raw materials, their arrival at the Rouge Plant in Dearborn, and through the great blast-furnace building through which they pass in the process of making Ford cars and trucks. It is, in short, an education in the extent and meaning of modern volume production.

Miles of Conveyors

While an unseen speaker explains each scene, the audience is taken on a tour of the plant and through the great blast-furnace building where ore is converted into iron. Forty kinds of steel, each of a composition to serve a definite purpose, are used in the Ford car and truck.

The picture shows also the manufacture of glass in an endless unbroken strip, a process developed by Ford engineers; the machine shops in which parts for the car are manufactured; the pressed steel building with its gigantic presses; and the coke ovens and other units in which by-products are recovered to the extent of millions of dollars annually.

Cars on Display

In addition to the picture, there will be a representative line of Ford cars and trucks and display boards containing car and truck parts. The cars alone are well worth a visit for they include body types to suit any taste and to meet any occasion.
