Frank McGinley, of Wilmington, former state assemblyman, has secured the endorsement of nine prominent associations for his candidacy for councilman of the 15th Los Angeles District, according to a report from his campaign headquarters yesterday.

These endorsements include the Municipal League, Municipal Light and Power Defense League, International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, Local Union No. 18; Carpenters and Associated Crafts; Federated Voters, the Four Transportation Brotherhoods, Public Service League, the Merchants Plumbers' Association, the Los Angeles Non-Partisan Association and the Federated Voters of the Los Angeles Amusement Organization, the latter giving McGinley the only vote of approval granted in this election.
