**Abalone Shell Bill Fails in Legislature**  
With the adjournment of the Legislature many hours after the actual quitting time, the last prospect that the assembly bill permitting the exportation of raw abalone shells out of the state would become part of the fish and game laws faded and died—much to the gratification of the Salm Manufacturing Company and Carl Hyde, who had labored long in opposition to the measure.  
The amendment to the game laws would have worked irreparable injury to the Salm company here which manufacturers commercial articles out of the shells as it would have allowed competition from cheap foreign labor fields. Hyde made a number of trips to Sacramento in defense of the local industry and his efforts contributed largely to its failure, according to Salm Manufacturing officials.
