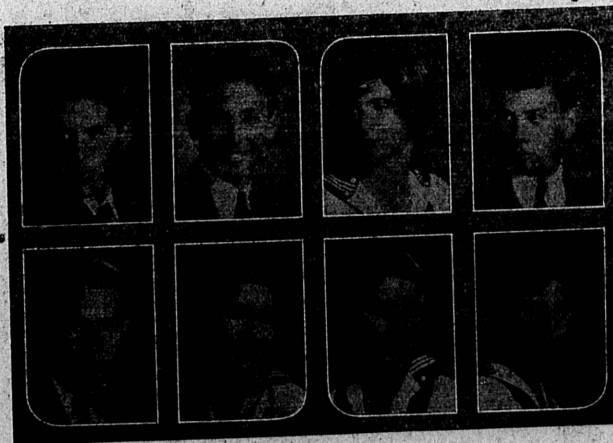

Statistics Show College Prexys Last Five Years

SACRAMENTO. — The average college president is 55 years old, married, and the chances are even that he will not serve more than five years.
These sidelights have been disclosed by a survey into administrative phases of colleges by William John Cooper, federal commissioner of education and formerly California's state superintendent of public instruction.
That the actual length of service is short, and that there is considerable turnover in the position is disclosed by the fact that 167 presidents served less than five years. The study also shows 76 presidents having served between five and 10 years and a great majority have held positions less than 10 years.

A. & P. SALES SHOW BUT SLIGHT DECREASE, REPORT

Sales of the Great Atlantic and Pacific Tea Company for the five-week period ending May 30 were \$102,946,053. This compares with \$104,673,214 for the same period in 1930, and is a decrease of \$1,727,161, or 1.65%.
More goods were sold during the May period in 1931 than in the same period a year ago, as shown in the estimated tonnage figures. May sales, expressed in tons, were 583,223 this year, compared with 488,753 in May, 1930. This is a gain in quantity of merchandise sold of 74,470, or 15.2%.
