"We submit a report on the machine's condition all the way through and if the owner wishes, we will do the work suggested. The small monthly inspection charge should be regarded as an ordinary insurance premium on the car, as it covers every detail of the car's working order. We may not be able to take in as many as we desire to, or as many as may apply."
