

School Costs Per Pupil Given Auditor Lenz' report shows that the cost of operating (and this includes expenses of instruction, operation of the various schools and maintenance) the Elementary school there is \$107.66 per pupil, this cost being based on the "average daily attendance" figure of 835 pupils. At the Fern Avenue school, which has an "A.D.A." of 110 pupils. this cost is \$117.81; and the Walteria school's cost is \$101.08 for each of the 104 pupils. The High school and Junior High is operated at a cost of \$217.01 per student, this based on an average attendance of 563. But what of this \$135,026 surplus?

But what of this \$135,026 surplus?

Estimate Cost of Overhead

Estimate Cost of Overhead This remaining question, which naturally brings to mind the secondary query of "How much does the over-head or 'general control' of our local schools cost?" was partly answered by Auditor Lenz when he said: "Off-hand and without consulting the records, which I do not have in my possession right now as they are at the printer's for compilation in the school report, I would say that the general control cost would be about \$15 per pupil, based on average attendance figures. You must re-member that the Los Angeles school system represents a huge investment and that it takes hundreds and hundreds of workers with whom the average citizen never comes in contact, to run the schools. It is the cost of this unseen and little noticed work that constitutes our general control expense." expense."

If we take the auditor's estimated cost of this overhead-\$15 per pupil-and multiply that by 1612, the number of children in all Torrance schools, we have \$24,180-the estimated cost of the system's "general control" applicable to Torrance institutions. Subtract this \$24,180 from the \$135,026 surplus and we still have \$110,846, which is Torrance's evident dona-tion to the Los Angeles school system. Own Schools May Save Margar

Own Schools May Save Money

Thus we find that Torrance taxpayers have made a ntribution of about 27 per cent of their school tax money

contribution of about 27 per cent of their school fax money to the Los Angeles school system for the maintenance and operation of schools not within the city limits. This is equivalent to 45 cents on each \$100 assessed valuation. In view of the fact that Torrance may, on adoption of a city charter, automatically divorce herself from the Los Angeles city system, an action which, in the opinion of County Counsel Mattion, is automatic with the establishment of a chartered city within the boun-daries of the Los Angeles school district, it appears that such a "divorce" would mean a saving to local taxpayers of a sum equal to approximately 70% of the entire 65-cent municipal tax rate this year. This, of course, is predicated upon the assumptions that: Torrance automatically forces ittself out of the Los Angeles school system and must create its own school dis-trict; and that the city could operate, maintain and control its school institutions on the same basis of cost as the Los Angeles system.


