Following its characteristic policies, the Los Angeles Board immediately ruled that all their students would have to attend the North Vermont avenue institution. But they reckoned without their own constituents," the Compton paper declared.
"The howl that went up from the Harbor areas was deafening. L. C. Mott, of San Pedro; G. H. Moore, of Wilmington, and Carl Hyde, of Torrance, chamber of commerce secretaries, marshaled their forces for battle. Los Angeles authorities soon realized that if they didn't permit students from the area concerned to attend school in Compton they would have to provide another junior college in the Harbor District.
"Two hearings were held before the Los Angeles board, which twice reversed itself before the final decision took place. Even as late as last Thursday, Secretary W. A. Sheldon reported that the Los Angeles board had turned down one proposition but reported that another plan was being drafted."
