## Gypsy Betrothal Party Reported By Local Writer

For he danced hour after hour Sunday, nor will he need an old-age pension from the state, for Uwanivach owns a magnificent ranch in the San Fernando valley and there is a ballroom there said to be over 50 feet long where a three-day celebration is held each year in honor of St. John's Day.

Singing Unwritten Songs

Arriving in the morning I found the pigs and lamb already roasting on the spit, eight eucalyptus poles around an open fire were placed like a fence and each answered a caracas. These were constantly turned by gypsy boys and sometimes the women. The musicians were already strumming away, such music as we seldom hear at any price. A Russian orchestra consisting of five pieces, violin, drums, clarinet, guitar and accordion, played in an open tent. Rugs were on the floor, and hour after hour the dancing went on. Old women with the grace of youth danced alone or in the circles, tiny boys and girls old men.

Occasionally the gypsies broke into song as they danced, songs of Serbia, Bohemia, Russia—Gypsy songs that have never been set to music. One could never forget the grace of the dancers—no cheek-to-cheek, strange holds of the "civilized" dance room; no young men dragging maidens wildly about, because they barely touched arms as they danced in the circle in the carpeted tents or out on the bare, uneven ground.

Upon arrival of King Marks, he took the Gypsy banner, bright red silk surmounted by a small American flag, and led his people out upon the light where, in a large circle, they danced for hours more.

5000 Gains Needlework

Meanwhile some of the women were washing dishes, a large lettuce leaf serving as a dishcloth, others cut up lettuce, tomatoes, bread, celery and the barbecued meat. Then long needles were laid down the center of the tents, the foot placed upon it and every one sat down and helped himself. No silver, salt, pepper, butter—no individual plates were used. The grape juice (deponent makes no statements as to the accuracy of the same) was poured from jugs, tea kettles, bottles, and young and old drank and ate.

About the camp were the gypsy cars, Cadillac, Packards, Pierce-Arrows, Lincolns. The watch chains of the kings, Uwanivach and Marks, were about a foot and a half long, of hand carved gold. Men and women wore hand-made rings, the women mostly wore earrings also of heavy, hand-carved gold.

And the necklaces, not one but several heavy chains of gold and coins. After the reporter had counted on one girl's neck 15 twenty-dollar gold pieces, two chains of ten and five, and some gold coins of foreign denominations, she lost count. Anyhow, that one girl had about \$500 in coins around her neck.

A Gypsy Fashion Show

As for the bride, she didn't go empty handed to her husband. Many dimes and quarters were collected from the crowd for small silk ribbons "just for luck for the bride," then Steve Uwanivach gave out silk scarfs, red, cerise, blue, to the Gypsies, each Gypsy receiving a scarf that contributed a bill, nothing less than \$5. The bride was brought forward and the bills, about a gallon of them, poured into her silver overdress.

The costumes of the women were of most beautiful heavy silks of every hue, with heavy fringes of gold and silver lace. Even the little tots had long, full skirts fringed with the expensive laces. Over their heads the women wore silk scarfs of red, cerise, maroon, blue. The king was distinguished by a cerise scarf, knotted over the breast, arranged shawl fashion over the right shoulder, and the groom, Steve Williams, was also draped with the cerise scarf. George Williams, brother of the young Steve, wore a cerise girlie.

He introduced the bride to the throng; hence his picture appears in a number of papers as the bride being taken, I saw the young Steve taking care of a crying baby—for among the gypsies everyone takes care of the babies.

Women Shun "Makeup"

Many people attended the fête Sunday expecting to see drunkenness and rowdiness. They were disappointed. The wine glasses were empty, the grape juice passed often and all the time. Some of the men became affectionate under its spell and kissed each other in the dances. Whiskey, alcohol, I saw none. There was an occasional bottle of beer. But throughout the day I saw only courtesy and good nature, not only to each other, but to the visitors. It was my good fortune to meet kings, kings' wives, kings' sons and daughters, and all including the tiny children, were courteous. Among the tribe were Elks, Odd Fellows, and Masons. One thirty-second degree Mason, well educated, told us the Adams tribes were Roman Gypsies, that there were many Serbians and many Brazilians among them.

Just one last word—not one Gypsy woman or maiden had lipstick, rouge, or powder.

**To Take Movies of Boulder Dam Steel Fabricated Locally**

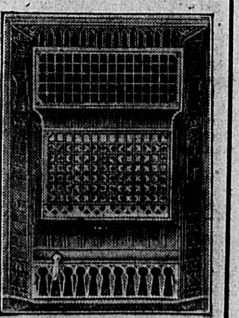
