Ground squirrels, coyotes, rabbits, and other animal pests in the Palos Verdes hills. Prior to that time ranchers and officials utilized other poisons, notably swift in character. Thallium, while deadly in effect, is slow to act, and its intermediate results, between the taking of the bait and the final death of the animal, are distressing in the extreme. Crazed by fever and thirst, the animals sometimes live for weeks, tortured by a slow paralysis, their flesh rotting on their bones. Human beings poisoned by thallium, show much the same symptoms. The hair falls out until the person is entirely bald; gradual paralysis sets in and death or long-enduring invalidism follows. Since the death of five Mexicans at Fresno, poisoned by eating barley treated with thallium, which had been intended for the destruction of animal pests, the attention of authorities over the state have been centered on the use of this particular metal. Medical authorities have experimented for years in an effort to find a successful antidote for the poison. Dr. J. C. Munch, federal toxicologist, who came by airplane from Pennsylvania to study the condition of the unfortunate victims at Fresno, failed to reach there until after five victims had died. Dr. Munch had concentrated for a long time with anthrax to find a successful antidote for the poison, and finally obtained a formula which brought about recovery of animals to which the poison had been administered. With this antidote a number of Mexicans at the San Joaquin valley city were successfully treated by Munch's formula last week with Anaheim physicians who had treated the John Kelsay family formerly of that city, who had been victims of the poison several months ago. Four members of the family were seriously ill for several weeks but eventually recovered. The child of a neighbor, also stricken, died from the effect.

Drunk Driving Brings Revoke of 779 Licenses

SACRAMENTO.—Driving while intoxicated resulted in the revocation of the licenses of 779 drivers during 1931 or more than one-third of the total cancellations for all offenders. E. Raymond Cato, chief of the California Highway Patrol, explained that his men made a special effort against this type of offenders during the year. A total of 1,775 licenses were revoked for all causes.
