#### New Brake Law **Effective Soon**

SACRAMENTO.—The California Highway Patrol today reminded owners of trucks and other commercial vehicles that a new section of the motor vehicle act will become effective August 14th of this year requiring such vehicles to have brakes that meet a higher standard of efficiency.

Under this section all commercial vehicles must have brakes that meet a higher standard of efficiency.

Under this section all commercial vehicles must have brakes that will enable the drivers to bring them to a complete stop within 37 feet when travelling at 20 miles per hour. The date upon which the section becomes effective was set purposely for August 14, 1932, by the legislature to give truck owners time to have the necessary adjustments made.

At present and until August 14, 1929, may be operated if their brakes will stop them in 50 feet while traveling at a speed of 20 miles an hour. All passenger -carrying vehicles, however, must now be able to stop within 37 feet at 20 miles per hour.
