Births Decrease "Bables cost too much," is the cry of the average family, accord-ing to Dr. J. L. Pomeroy, county health officer. High prices charged by the stork and reductions in wages are re-sponsible for the general decrease of birth rates throughout the na-tion. Dr. Pomeroy says. "More than 75 per cent of the families who say they don't want bables give the reason we can't bables give the reason we can't tafford then'; very few express dislike for bables," the health offi-cer says. "About 25 per cent of these families don't want bables because of physical reasons which might endanger the life of the mother." 20 Per Cent of Salary:

might endanger the life of the mother." 20 Per Cent of Salary: Bables cost an average of \$300 Aplece including physician's fees and hospital care, a price that amounts to emore than 20 per cent of the annual salary of the aver-age family. Dr. Pomeroy points out. The average charge made by physicians for maternity cases is \$200, the lowest being \$50 and the highest \$2,000. Three weeks' confinement in a hospital, operat-ing room, anaesthetic, etc., cost from \$100 to \$500 additional. Sun-dry other fees and bills for medi-clie and prescriptions bring the fotal cost of a baby up to a staggering total, the health officer mays, enough.

Ily stationary last year with buil 15.99 births per thousand population, the trend is consistently downward throughout the nation it is reported. Despite the stationary birth rate in the county a 33 per cent reduction in infant mortality during the same period assures a substantial increase in the year's crop of bables, Dr. Pomeroy asserts, due to the 80 infant and child hygiene conferences for mothers held weekly in the various health centers throughout the county.
Since the home is the backbone of a nation and since children are a circling need of the times, Dr. Pomeroy urged.


