MINUTES OF THE REGULAR MEETING OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF TORRANCE.

The regular meeting of the City Council of the City of Torrance, California, was held in the Council Chambers at Torrance, California, April 5th, 1932, and was called to order at 7:45 P. M. by Mayor Dennis.

Councilman Steiner moved that the minutes of the regular meeting of March 23rd, 1932, and the minutes of a Special meeting of March 21st, 1932, be adopted. Councilman Smith seconded the motion, which was carried unanimously.

Mr. Clarence Pinkham made application in writing for a license to continue the Pool Hall business formerly operated by Mr. Johnson, at Carson and Chabito. Councilman Steiner moved license be granted. Councilman Smith seconded the motion, which was carried unanimously.

A communication was read from the Board of Supervisors regarding the adopted of a Resolution authorizing an appropriation for the improvement of Sepulveda Boulevard. Councilman Steiner moved communication be filed for future reference and that a letter be sent thanking the Board of Supervisors for the appropriation. Councilman Bell seconded the motion, which was carried unanimously.

Resolution No. 328. BEING A RESOLUTION TO CANCEL ALL ASSESSMENTS FOR GENERAL TAX PURPOSES AND CANCEL ALL LIENS FOR GENERAL TAXES AGAINST CERTAIN PROPERTY IN THE CITY OF TORRANCE.

Councilman Steiner moved the adoption of Resolution No. 328. Councilman Smith seconded the motion, which was carried unanimously.

The meeting adjourned at 8:06 P. M.

Mr. Nelson, for the Torrance Water, Light and Power Company, asked permission to move some new pipe and fittings on to lots 15 and 16, in Block 52, Torrance Tract. He stated that he was fully aware that the lots were in the residential district but that the pipe would not be piled so that it would be unsightly. Mayor Dennis stated that he would ask the Council as a whole, together with City Engineer and Mr. Nelson, to make an investigation as to the actual conditions and report at the next meeting.

In the matter of a change from a Flat Rate to a Metered Rate for the ornamental lights within the City which had previously been called to the attention of the Council, a letter was read from Mr. C. W. Kotner in answer to a letter from the City Engineer stating that a saving of about \$2000.00 per year could undoubtedly be made by the change under present conditions. City Engineer Leonard stated that it would be necessary to provide four footed poles for the accommodation of meters, which would be located at the various vaults. The expense of this installation would be about \$300.00; but that he believed a saving of about \$2000.00 per year could be effected by the change when all of the lights are in service and recommended that the change be made. Councilman Steiner moved the matter be taken under advisement until next meeting. Councilman Smith seconded the motion, which was carried unanimously.

## Garden Talk

### Modern Vogue in Gladiolus

Gladiolus will receive unusual attention this year because it is one of the flowers that will continue blooming during the summer period, while the Olympic games visitors are on the Pacific coast.

Depending somewhat on weather conditions most gladiolus will bloom in from 90 to 120 days from time of planting. Bulbs should be covered to a depth of about three to three-and-one-half inches. For the taller growing sorts it is well to provide a support. Light bamboo stakes are very satisfactory for this purpose.

Hundreds of new varieties of gladiolus are available and many of them, though only recently introduced, have already become nationally renowned. At last year's flower shows outstanding sorts exhibited included Mrs. Leon Douglas, a combination of rose flame and brilliant scarlet; W. H. Phipps, salmon pink and frequently called the "Wonder" gladiolus; Dr. F. E. Bennett, a lovely new scarlet; Betty Nutball, orange and pink; Minuet, a beautiful clear lavender; Butterbox, an attractive butterfly yellow. These are all blue ribbon sorts and are now available in sufficient numbers throughout the Pacific coast states that they may be liberally included in every up-to-date garden.

With their tall spikes and brilliant blooms, gladiolus are a beautiful addition to any garden, and are a delight to the householder in providing cut flowers.

Plant the bulbs at frequent intervals throughout the spring and early summer season, and provide yourself with continuous bloom for many months.

Improve your beds and borders with abyssum, ageratum, etc.

Spray continuously for the control of aphid.

Plant perennial seeds early.

Spray with arsenate of lead for the control of caterpillars and other leaf-eating insects.

A dusting of sulphur will often prevent and control mildew on roses.

Sow the seed of larkspur where the plants are to remain. Do not transplant them.

Plant gladiolus bulbs at frequent intervals for continuous bloom.

Scatter grass seed on the lawn in the thin spots if you have not already attended to it.

To prolong the blooming season of sweet peas, pick them every day.
