These words from Job constitute the Golden Text in the Lesson-Sermon on "Adam and Fallen Man" on Sunday, May 8, in all branches of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Mass.
One of the Bible citations presents statements from Genesis: "And God said, Let us make man in our image, after our likeness; and let them have dominion over the fish of the sea, and over the fowl of the air, and over the cattle, and over all the earth, and over every creeping thing that creepeth upon the earth. So God created man in his own image, in the image of God created he him; male and female created he them."
A correlative passage from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy, states: "The Scriptures inform us that man is made in the image and likeness of God. Matter is not that likeness. The likeness of Spirit cannot be so unlike Spirit. Man is spiritual and perfect; and because he is spiritual and perfect, he must be so understood in Christian Science."

Men's Bible Class Special Program For Mother's Day

Place Scouts Under Council Jurisdiction

New Stamps to Carry Motif of Tenth Olympiad

Two hundred men! two hundred mothers! With wives, sisters, sweethearts, daughters and friends in a great community-wide Mother's Day service in the Torrance theatre, Sunday, May 8th, promptly at 9:30 a. m. That is the story of the special session of the Torrance Men's Bible class for next Sunday, according to the Rev. George Elders, teacher of the class. The committee has prepared an unusual program for this "open session." Tender Mother's Day songs, songs you love to hear and help sing. A series of mother pantomimes will be given and the teacher will bring an appropriate message.
Those attending the session are requested to wear a flower in memory of mother. In extending his invitation to the men of the community, Rev. Elders said: "If your mother is still living and well, bring her with you. If she has gone to her eternal home, be present for her sake. This is the least you can do for her who sacrificed so much for you."

In conformity with the national plan of organization, the Los Angeles County Council of the Boy Scouts of America are organizing the area under the jurisdiction of the council into eight divisions. Each division will be headed by a chairman who will also be a member of the executive board of the Los Angeles County Council. Chairmen of the various committees of the division organization will also be members of the same committee of the County Council. In this way a more unified administration of county units will be obtained, and each division will receive the benefit of ideas worked out in the larger units.
At a meeting held at the California Bank in Wilmington, Don Fohl was elected chairman of the Harbor division, consisting of the four districts of San Pedro, Wilmington, Torrance and Gardena. Herbert S. Wood of Torrance was elected chairman of the training and reading committee. C. L. Christie of Wilmington, civic service committee; C. B. Hollingsworth, San Pedro, special events committee; J. A. Moody, San Pedro, sea scouting committee. These men, together with the four district commissioners, W. B. Chestnut, San Pedro; Steve Cape, Wilmington; F. L. Parks, Torrance; T. O. Seaman, Gardena, will comprise the divisional organization at present.

LOS ANGELES.—Olympic stamps to be placed on sale in Southern California on June 1, will carry designs of a discus thrower superimposed on a globe showing the western hemisphere and of a sprinter poised at the tape, carrying out the motif of the Tenth Olympiad. It was revealed today in a communication from Congressman Joe Crail from Washington.
Two sets of stamps will be issued, depending upon what Congress does with the proposal to increase the postage rates. They will be either a two-cent stamp and a five-cent stamp or a three-cent stamp and a five-cent stamp. The colors will be red, purple or blue, conforming with the present color scheme governing two, three and five-cent stamps.
Incidentally, Congressman Crail states he still is hopeful that the first-class postage rate will not be increased by Congress at this session, as has been suggested as one means of balancing the budget. He believes that other means may be found for this purpose.

A special Mother's Day worship service will be held at the First Christian church, Torrance, next Sunday morning, May 8, beginning at 10:50 o'clock sharp. The choir will sing mother songs and the pastor, Rev. George Elders, will bring a message fitting for the occasion.
A special effort is being made to beautify the main auditorium with a great profusion of flowers. Commenting on the service the pastor said: "We plan to make it a great family gathering. Fathers, mothers, husbands, wives, sons, daughters and sweethearts, all who love mother, are invited to join in honoring their best earthly friend."
