

Political Conditions In Islands

Deplorable political conditions in Hawaii are frankly revealed in a letter received recently by Newton L. Hall of the Hall Metal Products company in this city. The letter written by a friend of Mr. Hall's who is traveling in Europe and the Orient, follows in part: "Honolulu, T. H., May 8, 1932. "We have had no end of excitement over here with the several rape cases.

It can truthfully be said that these politicians de believe in the public be amend policy—we do as we please,

"Everyone here, outside of the politicians, is hoping that Uncle Sam will put these islands under a commission government, for then, and not until then, will they become the 'Paradise of the Pacific'."
