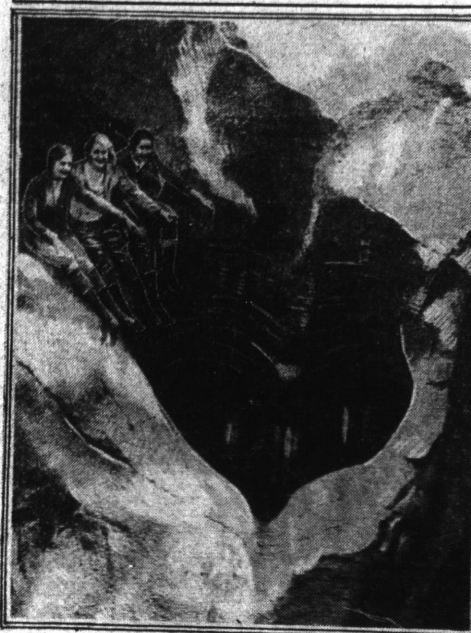

Government Tax On Commodities Now In Effect

Increased Rate On First-class Postage to Be Effective July 6

Government taxes, which went into effect on Tuesday, June 21, which will affect the average person are as follows: Lubricating oil, 4c a gallon. Tires and tubes, 2½c and 4c a pound. Jewelry, 10 per cent on amounts over \$3.

Automobiles, 3 per cent. Radio equipment, 5 per cent. Candy and chewing gum, 2 per cent. Gasoline, 1c a gallon. Telephone, 10c between 50c and \$1, 15c between \$1 and \$2, 20c over \$2. Telephone, 5 per cent. Cable and radio, 10c. Admissions, 1c per 10c on admissions over 40c. Safe deposit boxes, 10c. Checks, 2c each.

On July 6 the new three-cent postal rate for first-class matter will become effective. The government printing process is already busy turning out 4,000,000,000 of the new three-cent stamps. They will be ready for sale and distribution at all post offices on July 1. In regard to the tax on admissions, the law requires that it applies to admissions to any place of amusement or entertainment whether a theater or not. Free or reduced rate admissions (except bona fide employees, municipal officers on official business and children under 12 years) are taxed at the same rate as those who pay the regular admission fee. Certain exemptions are made in the case of religious, educational or charitable institutions, but these exemptions do not apply if the entertainment offered is of a sporting nature such as boxing, wrestling, or other pugilistic exhibitions. No exemption is made in case of admissions to athletic games or exhibitions the proceeds of which go wholly or partly to the benefit of a college or university including the academies of the military or naval forces of the United States.

Thomas J. Wilkes, recently a candidate for the office of councilman on the Klusman ticket, residing at 2717 Carson street, has been taken to the Pacific Electric hospital at Los Angeles for treatment, as a result of an attack of a rare disease which manifested itself during the past week. Wilkes' malady is said to be due to an affection of the pancreas, the early symptoms of which resemble ptomaine poisoning, and later induce a general paralysis. According to the attending physician, the disease is so rare a type that in 10 years of practice in Torrance he has never had a similar case. It was hoped that an operation performed Sunday would bring about an improvement, but up to the present Wilkes' condition remains very serious.
