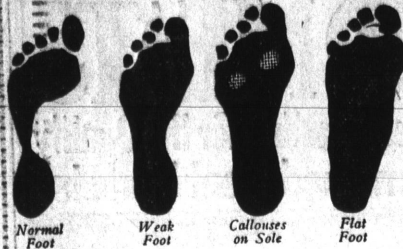

PRESERVES

With spring fruits and vegetables filling the markets in tempting array, it is easy to fill a few jars almost every day with something delicious to put away for winter meals.

If only a small amount is canned at one time, the resulting product will be much better and the canning really a lot of fun and not at all tiresome.

Preserves are something that can be easily made at most any time and in many interesting combinations. Vegetables as well as fruits lend themselves well to preserving and many delicious preserves and sweetmeats may be made and stored away to be used on special occasions through the winter months, and, too, they make attractive gifts for the holiday season.

The wise homemaker keeps this in mind all through the canning season and often reserves one whole shelf in the preserve closet for interestingly shaped jars and pots of delicious concoctions that will find their way to some fortunate friend.

Cherries will soon be plentiful in all the markets and most varieties may be used alone or in combination with other fruits for preserves and conserves.

Cherry or Raspberry Preserves. 5 lbs. cherries or raspberries. 5 lbs. sugar.

Wash raspberries, do not mash; or wash, pick over and stone the cherries. Place in preserving kettle, alternate layers of sugar and fruit; let stand over night. Bring slowly to the boiling point and boil rapidly until thick and clear. Put away in glasses or jars and seal with paraffin.

Cherry, Currants and Raspberry Conserve. 1 qt. cherries stoned. 1 qt. large currants. 1 pint raspberries. 1 large orange. Sugar.

Wash and pick over the fruit. Cut the orange in thin slices. Weigh and add an equal amount of sugar. Let come to a boil slowly, then boil rapidly until thick. Turn into jelly glasses.

Marsteller, adjutant of the Bert S. Crossland post.

Those who sign up will be furnished with postcards addressed to Frank B. Williams, vice chairman of the Conservation and Fire Prevention Commission, on which to report any violation of the state fire laws observed by the pledgee. In response to the card, a letter will be sent to the person who has been reported, admonishing him to be careful and to avoid further violations. No prosecutions are to be initiated as a result of these reports, but an attempt will be made to bring home to everyone the value of law observance and care in regard to fires.
