Co. Sanitation Tax Rate Will Not Increase

Reduction in Assessed Valuation Will Save Taxpayer Money

Tax rates in County Sanitation District No. 5 will probably remain the same this year, even though the assessed valuations of the district has been reduced approximately 20%, according to information received today from A. K. Warren, chief engineer of the county sanitation districts.

Through strict economy during the past year the actual cash on hand has been increased to \$160,503.74 as compared with \$157,564.24 on hand at this time last year, even though the delinquent taxes for the past year have amounted to \$25,740.00. The amount to be refunded for interest and sinking fund requirements has been reduced to \$92,270.43 as compared with \$106,631.37 last year, and the maintenance and operating requirements have been reduced to \$2,078.53 as compared with \$46,383.82 last year.

The budget covers a period of one and one-half years—July 1, 1932, to December 31, 1933. The money required for that period, less the cash on hand from the last tax collection, constitutes the amount necessary to be raised by the next tax levy.

Warren further reported to the board of directors that the work of constructing the South Inglewood-Orange avenue trunk sewer north of Hawthorne was progressing at a very satisfactory rate and would be completed early in September. This section of sewer is being constructed at a cost of approximately \$30,000 and extends along Walnut street from Broadway to Lincoln avenue, along Lincoln to Lockhaven, thence north on Lockhaven to Pine avenue.

The life consists of vitrified clay pipe ranging from 15 inches to 21 inches in diameter and will serve the area north of Hawthorne and southeast of Inglewood as a main trunk sewer, but property abutting on the line will be permitted to make direct connection. The sewer line is laid but through an arrangement with the department of charities of the county use has been made of funds of that department to employ about 75 men for the purpose instead of using machinery.

Thus the actual cost of the work will not be increased to the sanitation district, but a greater amount of employment is being provided.
