Dr. Michelson to Speak on "Judaism" At Christian Church

Dr. A. U. Michelson, a Jew, Judaean statesman and author from Berlin, Germany, will deliver two addresses at the First Christian Church, Torrance, next Sunday, December 4. Dr. Michelson is the son of an orthodox Jew brought up in the home of a Jewish rabbi. He studied in the University of Berlin and other European Universities, and graduated with the highest degree.

Through the study of philosophy he became a free thinker and repudiated all religions, Judaism included. At 2:45 his subject will be, "Judaism, Rabbinism and Zionism." At 7:30, "A Jewish Judge and Attorney's Conversion to Christ." The 2:45 service will be a union service of the cooperating churches of Torrance. Everyone is cordially invited to these special services.

Possible Sell-Out Forecast for the Trojan-Irish Game

LOS ANGELES.—Spurred by reports of the great showing of Notre Dame in defeating the Army 21 to 0 last Saturday, ticket reservations for the Southern California-Notre Dame battle, December 10, are pouring in at a rate which indicates a possible sellout by game time of the coliseum. It was announced today by Arnold Eddy, general manager of the Trojan student body.

Eddy's report states that thousands of good seats are still available in spite of the increased demand. Reserved seat prices have been set at \$4.40 and \$2.20, including government tax. Trojan ticket offices are still being maintained at B. H. Dyas Company, Seventh and Olive streets, Los Angeles, and the Broadway Hollywood store, Hollywood boulevard and Vine street, Hollywood, as well as on the Trojan campus in the Associated Students store.

Seating 105,000, the coliseum has been filled to capacity only twice, during the Olympic games. A sell-out would shatter all national football attendance records for 1932, and would make the Trojan-Irish crowd the largest in the history of the West.

"Rejoicing in Hope," Bible Sunday Theme

"Rejoicing in Hope," is the theme this year for Universal Bible Sunday, which will be observed in the churches on Sunday, December 4, in Torrance and elsewhere. This year's theme was chosen by unanimous agreement of the committee of the board of managers of the American Bible Society, which sought for a text which would not feature the "depression." "The Christian religion is not a defeatist faith," says the Rev. Albert W. Heaven, one of those charged with the duty of selecting the text. "It is predicated on a God under whose wisdom 'all things work together for good.' Knowing that the Bible abounds in passages proclaiming this faith, the words of St. Paul, found in the twelfth chapter of his letter to the Romans was selected."

No Lack of Toys For Lomita Kids This Christmas

Fire Fighters Complete Self-imposed Task of Making Tots Happy

LOMITA.—Lomita firemen have whiled away their spare hours during the past few weeks in a commendable task which has brought pleasure to themselves and will bring unlimited delight to the youngsters of Lomita when Santa Claus drives around this year to distribute gifts.

The outlying buildings back of the fire department headquarters are now filled with overflowing with handsome and substantial wooden toys, made by the willing hands of Harry Wray Nansel, Carl Schultz and Captain Frank Laski, all of whom are now grinning broadly as they exhibit the toys to admiring visitors.

There are little tables and chairs to match, little lawn benches, doll beds, and another new thought, which will please the boys, a lot of wind whirligigs to be nailed up on the garage roof or some other high place where they can catch the breeze and show the direction and speed of the wind.

All these toys are substantially finished and are painted in bright colors. There will be many a little heart in Lomita which will overflow with joy when these little pieces of furniture are delivered.

The toys are all done now and will be turned over to George G. Key of the Lomita Relief Association and to Mrs. Maxine Welch, head of the Red Cross in Lomita, who will see that they are taken to the right places just before Christmas.

"I won't tell you where we got the lumber or the paint," said Captain Laski, "because the boys who donated the stuff don't want anybody to know where it came from. They are all modest or bashful and they don't want any thanks from anybody except their own knowledge that they have made some poor little kids happy. They were sure generous with their donations, because we have got enough material left over to start on the job next year. Oh, sure, we have been doing this for two or three years now and we are going to do it again. Probably we'll have some more new ideas for the next lot, as we don't want to flood the market with the same kind of toys. Oh, sure, it was a lot of fun doing it, and say, won't the kids be tickled?"

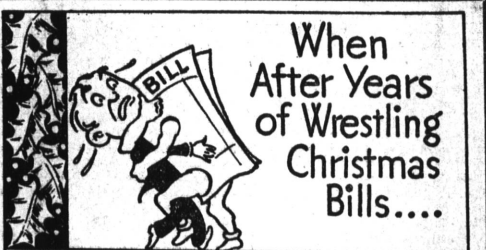

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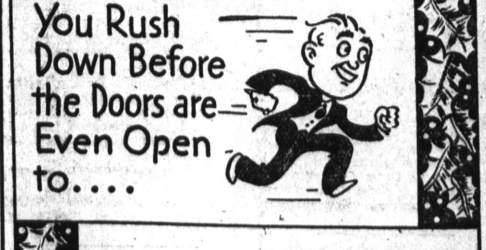
