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Poultrymen Plan Big Show In Jan.

Mid-Winter Exposition at Pasadena Will Embrace Unusual Features

Premium lists for the Los Angeles Mid-winter Poultry Exposition to be given under the auspices of the Pasadena Poultry Association, in the Pasadena Civic auditorium, on January 5 to 8, next year, are already in the mail, and Secretary Henry W. Adams reports that entries are being received daily.

One of the features of the show will be poultry institute lectures from 1 to 4 o'clock each afternoon of the display, lectures given by experts and of great practical value to those interested in raising poultry. On the first day the subject will be "Breeding and Mating"; and on the second, "Housing and Equipment"; third, "Feeds and Feeding"; and fourth, "Disease and Remedies."

Several novel features will be tried out, including a determination to have all the judging over on the first day, so that this may not interfere with the inspection of the exhibits. All of the concession spaces have been taken, and the show is thereby assured of at least 30 displays of much interest to the grower.

More than 2,700 pens will be on display at the show, including 1,500 poultry, 1,000 for pigeons, 200 for rabbits and at least a 100 for turkeys. The eight judges who will award the prizes are already selected, and even with so large a display they expect to get their work out of the way as planned.

Preliminary surveys indicate that poultrymen throughout the entire coast section will bring the elite of their blooded stock. In the number and quality of birds and animals in the show, it will be more than a sectional display. The interest shown by city dwellers in turning to small poultry farms as a means of livelihood during these times has been phenomenal.

Perhaps nothing will interest the public more than the fact that the show is open, free of charge to those who wish to attend. This is made possible by the financial backing given the exhibit by the county, which appropriated its budget show balance for that purpose.
