

The \$800,000-mark was passed Satur-day, and daily collections average between \$15,000 and \$25,000, ac-cording to W. O. Ashcroft, chief bookkeeper. Torrance residents are rominded that second installment taxes have been due and payable since Janu-ary 20. The percentage of collec-tions at the end of last week was 50.27 per cent, as compared with \$5.2p cent for the corresponding day last year. April 20 is the last day to pay second half taxes to escape a five per cent penalty.
